THE ROWAN COUNTY FEUDS ENDED.

MOREHEAD, Ky., Aug. 9.—There is a strong probability that the famous Rowan County troubles are at an end. For years the feud has given Kentucky a bad name throughout the country, and the prospect of a settlement would be hailed with satisfaction everywhere.

Craig Tolliver and Humphreys, leaders of the rival factions, have agreed, it is understood, to leave Rowan County forever. Papers to that effect have already been signed. The prosecution has consented to compromise by dismissing the cases against Tolliver and Humphreys in such event. Their conviction would be hard to secure on account of the difficulty of procuring witnesses, &c., so that this compromise is deemed the best plan to secure peace for a distracted portion of the State. Cook Humphreys is preparing to leave to-night for Texas, where he will go into the cattle business. Craig Tolliver will settle either in Kansas or Iowa, and will soon leave for his future home.
